COURSE SYLLABUS

Course Description

This course focuses on the language learner's ability to communicate about topics relating to themselves, such as self-description, basic needs, daily activities, preferences, everyday conversation, family, and friends. Proficiency in all language skills is achieved through a variety of daily activities such as listening to dialogues to learn the vocabulary and grammar in context as well as doing short and level-appropriate reading selections to gain exposure to vocabulary and grammar through context. Other activities include but are not limited to: paired interviews, group work, projects, and interactive classroom activities. Activities are designed to allow students to be successful in French II. In addition to improving language skills, students will learn about francophone cultures worldwide.

Technology Expectations

Grading Policy

LMS elective courses test on Mondays and Thursdays. Quizzes may be given on any day of the week. The final grade for French 1 is calculated in the student's high school GPA. Upon successful completion of Level I French, the student receives a Carnegie Unit toward graduation. School-required exams (semester, and final) will be weighted as per school policy.

70% tests, quizzes, and major projects

30% daily grades, homework, and participation

Opportunities to Make Up Work / Late Work Acceptance

After an absence, it is the student's responsibility to make up all missed assignments. For excused absences, adhere to school policy for completing and submitting missed work. Late work is accepted with the following penalties:

- One day late (10 points off from 100% total)
- > Two days late (20 points off from 100% total)
- ➤ More than 3 days late (50% off from 100% total)
- > Discuss with your teacher if more than 3 days late

Expectations - in and out of the classroom

Participation in class is the most important thing you can do to learn to speak and understand French! This includes:

- > Be on time and in class daily with an organized notebook and other supplies.
- > Students are to communicate in class in French as much as possible. Active participation is required for success in this class.
- ➤ <u>Listen quietly and respectfully</u> when others are talking or during instruction.
- Respect your surroundings, classmates, and teacher.
- ➤ Be open to trying new things and stepping outside of your comfort zone. We all make mistakes me too! Focus on what you can do instead of what you cannot do in French even more, mistakes are vital to growing your language skills!
- Obey all rules and policies stated in the Student Handbook.
- Learn vocabulary thoroughly for long-term retention (not just for one unit); study new and old words regularly (daily review encouraged).

Consequences for misbehavior or not participating appropriately will include (1st incident) warning/student conference (2nd incident) parent and coach notification (3rd incident) detention, and referral to administration.

Using Google Translate or other translation services for assignments is viewed as cheating. Doing so without my permission will result in a zero for the assignment in question. I will give you the vocabulary you need to know and will show you how to use other online sources to assist you in expressing yourself in the course.
