Course Description:

Students are introduced to various aspects of performing. Topics will include: improvisation, pantomime, voice and diction, acting principles, make-up, short production skits, monologues and variety of drama.

Students conclude the semester course with a one-act play production.

Course Objectives:

- Establish a working knowledge and critical understanding of theatre and plays.
- Develop performing skills and acting techniques through practice and experimentation.
- Build self-confidence by creating and performing dramatic works.
- Improve communication and collaboration with peers.
- Foster a love of the performing arts.

Classroom Expectations:

- 1. Students will show respect and support for their peers, teacher, and other artists at all times during this course.
- 2. Students will follow directions and do as they are asked.
- 3. Students will arrive to class, rehearsal, and performances on time and ready to participate in classwork and activities.
- 4. ABSOLUTELY NO horseplay or rough-housing in the classroom.
- 5. Electronic devices (and other distracting items) used without permission will be confiscated.
- 6. No food, gum, or beverages are allowed in the classroom EXCEPT a bottle of water.

Grading:	Test grades will account for 60% of the semester grade, with the remaining 40% being determined by quiz/daily grades. The final will count as 20% of the overall average. Grades will be a reflection of mastery of the standards. Make sure all absences are excused as work can be made up and graded for excused absences only.
Make-up Work:	Under normal circumstances, it is expected that students will submit <u>previously</u> assigned work upon return to school after an excused absence. All work missed on the day(s) of excused absences must be made up within a timeframe determined by the teacher. It is the responsibility of the student to ensure he or she makes up work following excused absences. Students will not receive credit for and will not be allowed to make up any assignments, tests, work, activities, etc., missed during unexcused absences.
Late Work:	For work turned in late, the following policy will apply: • The assignment will drop one LETTER grade for each school day that passes. For example, if an assignment is turned in one school day late, the highest a student can receive is 89%; two days late, 79%, etc. • Half credit is always better than no credit! Until work has been made up, "Missing" (which counts as a zero) will be put in the grade book. This will be updated once work is completed and turned in.
Accommodations:	Requests for accommodations for this course or any school event are welcomed from students and parents. Speak with me, call or e-mail me, or let a counselor know.
Turnitin Notice:	The majority of writing assignments in this course will be submitted to Turnitin via the Schoology learning platform. The primary focus of this software is to help students become better writers and scholars. Turnitin generates a report on the originality of student writing by comparing it with a database of periodicals, books, online content, student papers, and other published work. This program will help students discern when they are using sources fairly, citing properly, and paraphrasing effectively – skills essential to all academic work. Students will have the opportunity to review their Turnitin originality report and will have the opportunity to make revisions before submitting their work for grading. Once their work is submitted, teachers have the opportunity to view the student's originality report and grade accordingly.
Technology	 Student laptops should not be hard-wired to the network or have print capabilities. Use of discs, flash drives, or other USB devices is not allowed on MCS computers. Neither the teacher, nor the school is responsible for broken, stolen, or lost laptops. Laptops and other electronic devices will be used at the discretion of the teacher.
