They both add a lot of content to the base game with the addition of new characters, new maps, and new items.

The developers have continued to work and fix problems that have come up.

The game is great overall and heavily moddable.

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

Get to know the characters, Watch them grow old.


The soft crinkle of your pages, The crunch of your cover, murmuring of hometown, full of friends and things to discover.
