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

Welcome to Liberty Middle School!







What are pods?


Pods are groups of classrooms. They are colored so you can find your class more easily. Each pod is generally one or two subjects or grades.

Which way do I go?

At Liberty we have one-way traffic flow during class change, so everyone goes the same way. This helps with the flow of traffic because the halls are so congested. There are also designated stairs to go up and down.

How do I get to class?

When you get your schedule, memorize the teacher and pod location for each block. Remember, your schedule is listed in Powerschool. Then, when it is time to change classes, take a minute to stop and think about which pod you are going to next. Make sure you ask if you don't know where to go! Follow the one-way traffic flow and get there as quickly as you can. You have 5 minutes to get to class, so make sure you get to class on time.



Schedule Rotation and Advisory

The classes at Liberty are 75 minutes long. They are referred to as A block, B block, etc. A block is the 1st class you have in the 1st rotation, and so forth. When the quarters (9 weeks) change, some of the classes change as well (year long and semester long classes don't change yet), but the blocks are still referred to as A block, B block, etc. Sometimes, the schedule changes due to school events, but it remains the same pretty much every day.

The only day that has an exception is on Tuesdays.

On Tuesdays, we have advisory, which is pretty much like homeroom, but it is a class that teaches mental and social health education. We have interviewed Ms. Young, the assistant principal, to gain more insight on the purpose of advisory and how it helps students:

Q: What is the purpose of advisory?

A: The purpose of advisory in middle school is to support students' academic, social, and emotional development in a structured, intentional way. It serves as a consistent time during the week where students build relationships with a trusted adult and a small peer group, helping create a sense of belonging and connectedness within the school community. The other purpose to advisory is a chance to be able to directly teach character education.

Q: How does advisory help students?

A: Advisory helps students connect with an adult/teacher in the building. Students have the same advisory teacher from 6th to 8th grade. This group provides consistency and community. Also, character education helps you learn how to make good choices, treat others with respect, and be responsible. Talking about these things each week helps you grow into a kind, confident, and thoughtful person.

The weekly schedule changes every week to prevent students from missing the same classes if they need to check out from school. It can be confusing at first, but as you progress throughout the year, you get the hang of it.

The Liberty softball program is made up of one team of 7th and 8th grade girls. Tryouts typically occur in May for the following school year. These athletes demonstrate grit, dedication, and resilience both on and off the field. Each year, these girls show their skill and their team spirit in practice and in games.





The Liberty baseball program has two teams for 7th and 8th grade studentathletes, structured as "A and B" teams to maximize playing opportunities. There are two tryouts each year: a multi-day evaluation in the fall and a one-day tryout in late January for new players. Players participate in mandatory conditioning during the fall and begin partial practices after the Christmas break, with full practices starting in January. The season runs from President's Day to mid-April, allowing for 24 games against North Alabama schools. Membership is a privilege, and players must maintain high academic and behavioral standards.

GIRLS SOCCER



The Liberty Girls Soccer Team is a dedicated group of 7th and 8th grade girls who love soccer. Our season runs from January to April, emphasizing excellence, teamwork, and sportsmanship. We encourage each member to give their best in practices and games, fostering a supportive team culture. Players will improve their skills and learn valuable lessons in perseverance and leadership.

Choir



Choir is available for all grades here at Liberty. The course is all-year long, and auditions are held during the Fall semester.

Beginning choir is for 6th grade students, where

students will learn the fundamentals of singing and music theory.

The two other choirs- treble chorus (for 7th/8th grade female students) amd tenor/bass chorus (for 7th/8th grade male students) are the next levels of choir.

THE BANDS AT LIBERTY

The Liberty Middle School bands are split into 4 groups, with 2 extracurricular groups.

These groups are the Beginner Band, for beginner students with little to no band experience; the Intermediate Band, for lower-intermediate band students; the Concert Band, for upper-intermediate band students; and the Symphonic Band, for the school's most advanced band students.

The extracurricular groups are the Jazz Band, which is

open to members of the advanced (Intermediate, Concert, and Symphonic) bands, and the Percussion Ensemble, which is open to all advanced band percussion students.

None of these bands play with any stringed instruments.

In Beginner Band, you will learn how to play your instrument and play at a few concerts later in the year. In the advanced bands, you will refine your musicality and prepare for several performances, including







multiple pep band performances. You will also have the option of going on a band trip, which requires preparing for widely known competitions.





Liberty Middle School Art

There are many art classes here at LMS. For example, we have Intro to Visual Art, Visual Art, Advanced Art, and Sculpting/3D Art. Also, we have an active Art Club led by one of the Art teachers.

Intro to Visual Art- is a 9 week long class open to all students. It is designed to give students a simple understanding of different types of art. This includes art history and art criticism.

Intermediate Art- is a 9 week long class, which can be taken by students who have already taken Intro to Visual Arts. In this class, the students will learn a wide variety of art media and styles, like drawing, painting, and printmaking.

Sculpture- is a 9 week long course which focuses on 3D art. It is offered to only 7th and 8th grade students, and there is no needed class to take prior to it. The students get to use a variety of materials in this course, like clay, paper mache, and metal.

Advanced Art- is a semester long class offered to 7th and 8th graders who auditioned. Students work on improving their technical art skills and realism by using a wide variety of media and art techniques.

Beginning Theatre - This is a 9 week class that provides students a basic foundation to different theatre skills. Students learn about the history of theatre, pantomiming, tableaus, improvisation, and more things surrounding theatre. At the end of the 9 weeks, students work to perform a small, in-class production. This class is a great introduction if you're still finding your place, or just want to improve your theatre skills. It is open to all grades, 6-8.

Intermediate Theatre - This course is semester long for 7th and 8th graders and requires the Beginning Theatre course as a prerequisite.

basics, learn about fairytales, perform a puppet show, and then practice and rehearse to conclude the semester with a one-act play production. This course has a \$50 fee.

Advanced Theatre - The advanced theatre is a course designed to help students build their vocal, kinesthetic, emotional, analytical, and intellectual elements of theatrical training through activities in class, focused on developing such skills.

This class will perform one major production at the end of the year. To join, students must audition and be approved with a 1-minute monologue or obtain instructor approval. After school rehearsals and productions take place at the high school and will be mandatory to attend. This class is open to 6th-8th grades, and the class has a \$50 fee.

Junior Thespian Society - This is an honor society for theatre students.



Clubs and Extracurriculars at LMS

WHAT CLUBS ARE AVAILABLE AT LMS?

Some popular ones include 4-H Club, Anime and Manga Club, Art Club, Beta Club, Chess Club, Debate Club, Fellowship of Christian Athletes (FCA), First Priority, Girls Who Code, Green Power Team, Madison City Friends, Newspaper Club, Robotics, RPG Club, Scholars Bowl, Step Club, Student2Student (S2S), Technology Student and Association (TSA).

Some of these do require students to apply or attend an interest meeting.

Some organizations meet during the day as classes. You must register for these when you register for all other classes, so be sure to register for these ahead of time if you are interested. These include Yearbook, Digicom, Band, and Choir.

Along with clubs, you can also join sports! These sports include archery, baseball, softball, soccer, basketball, dance, competition cheer, basketball cheer, color guard, and volleyball. Most of these sports will require tryouts before, so watch out for emails or flyers regarding these sports. Sixth graders can't join teams, but they can become team managers.
