I. Course Description:

In this course students will continue to develop and enhance acquired skills from levels I & II. Students will focus on continued reading in Cambridge Latin Course and primary prose and poetry sources that illuminate the history and culture of Rome during the period of the golden age of Latin literature, the fall of the Republic, and the formation of the Roman Empire. A greater emphasis may be placed on self-expression and attaining an acceptable degree of written proficiency for communication in Latin.

II. Course Objectives:

- Ability to communicate in Latin via the use of verbs in all six tenses in both the indicative and subjunctive moods
- Acquisition of more complicated grammatical structures specific to the target language, including conditional sentences and indirect speech
- Ability to analyze the culture of Ancient Rome through the writings of primary authors and contrast ideals of Roman political factions
- Make connections between the ancient world and our modern society
- Compare the styles of Roman rhetoric with modern day speeches and similar culture issues found in both
- Identify English derivatives of Latin words commonly used in Latin prose and poetry

III. Classroom Expectations:

- Students will be expected to maintain their integrity.
- All students must actively participate in their own learning, in and out of the classroom and come to class prepared.
- All students must show respect to the peers, teachers, and guests.
- All students should ask for help when needed! You may schedule a conference or come during Refuel for help with concepts introduced in class.
- Phones should only be used in class when necessary for class activities.
 Students may be asked to give up their phone during class if it becomes a distraction.

Accommodations:

Requests for accommodations for this course or any school event are welcomed from students and parents.

Concerning laptop utilization:

- 1. Student laptops should not be hard wired to the network or have print capabilities.
- 2. Use of discs, flash drives, jump drives, or other USB devices will not be allowed on Madison City computers.

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3. Neither the teacher, nor the school is responsible for broken, stolen, or lost laptops.

4. Laptops and other electronic devices will be used at the individual discretion of the teacher.

IV. Grading Policy:

Test and quiz grades will account for 70% of the 9-weeks grade, with the remaining 30% being determined by daily grades. The grading scale is as follows: A (90-100), B (80-89), C (70-79), D (65-69), and F (below 65). Grades will be a reflection of mastery of the standards. Make sure all absences are excused as class work can be made up and graded for excused absences only. The Final Exam counts for 1/5 of final grade.

From Code of Student Conduct p. 11

"A student who cheats will not receive credit for the work in question. If any other student has cooperated in the cheating, that student is also considered to have cheated and will not receive credit. Cheating students will also be subject to the consequences in the disciplinary consequences in Section XXII of this CSC."

At the teacher's discretion, any student caught cheating or copying and those helping cheat or copy may be **excluded from joining the National Latin Honor Society**, at which time both the student and parent/guardian will be notified.

If an absence is planned, please let me know ahead of time so that I can inform you ahead of time what work you will be missing. After an absence, please see me for all missed work and clarifications. Any content from assignments completed in class may be asked on a test, so **it is the student's responsibility** to complete all work missed or risk missing grades and missing questions on a test.

All missed grades will receive a zero in the grade book until turned in completed. All work, including tests and project grades, will remain a zero in the case of an unexcused absence, even if the work was turned in.

Tests: Tests will be given approximately every two chapters of the book completed - about every 2-3 weeks. Tests will assess topics such as reading comprehension, vocabulary, grammar, culture, and characters and storylines from class readings. Because students will need to write out and/or explain many answers on tests, they may take up to a week or week and a half to grade.

Homework (Quizlet, other small assignments) is due for full credit on the date stated in class and on google classroom. For Quizlet homework grades not

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completed on time, students may receive up to half credit if completed within ONE day of the original due date. After the grace period of ONE day, no homework grades will be changed at all for the remainder of the semester. As written homework will be gone over in class when due, no credit will be given to late written assignments.

Classwork not completed in class must be completed at home and turned in at the beginning of the next class period to receive credit to prevent copying work.

V. Make-up Test and Classwork Policy: It is the student's responsibility to make arrangements for all missed work. Rescheduling during Refuel is preferable. All missed work will receive a ZERO in iNow until made up.

As per Madison City Policy, students with excused absences have as many days as they are absent to complete and turn in missing work for a full grade. After the allotted time, I will allow students to turn in completed work the following two school days for partial credit if they have an excused absence.

Students who have only missed one day including a test or quiz should be prepared to complete the test or quiz upon arrival either the following Refuel or class period. This is to help keep test materials from 'getting out' and so that students are able to receive timely feedback after an examination.

Students missing a day on which a project is due should turn their project in online on time to receive full credit.

As per Madison City Schools policy, any work missed during an unexcused absence, including classwork, quizzes, and tests, must receive a zero and cannot be made up for a grade other than zero.
