Course Description	<p>“This class is for students who have a passion for reading and demonstrate an ability to communicate effectively, in both the spoken and written word. The honors class will continue students’ growth in the areas of reading, writing, listening, speaking, discussion, and reflection. Reading strategies, critical thinking skills, vocabulary building, and a continued focus on writing comprise the main elements of reading instruction. The focus for writing instruction will be narrative, informational, and argumentative writing with requirements based on Alabama College and Career Ready standards. The overall goal of the class is to increase the literacy and writing ability of students, and to build the students’ reading and writing stamina, which will propel the students’ writing to more clear and concise prose. Outside reading and summer reading are required.” (p.3 from the Madison City Schools Course Catalog)</p>
Course Objectives	<p>Students will develop and strengthen critical thinking skills by reading, comprehending, and engaging with both literary and informational texts. Students will make text-to-text, text-to-world, and text-to-self connections. Students will be able to identify, define, and duplicate examples of figurative language found in texts. They will demonstrate their understanding of the text through various formative and summative assessments. Students will display the convergence of their independent thoughts and textual examples in the writing of paragraphs and essays, as well as develop clear and concise writing skills through the execution of writing assignments and the application of proofreading and editing skills. Students will also improve their writing through the increased understanding and application of grammar, mechanics, and vocabulary skills. Students will be able to respectfully engage critically and constructively in a dialogue of ideas through class discussion, small group assignments, and project-based learning. Students will develop and display clear written and verbal communication skills.</p>

Classroom Expectations	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1. Be seated and ready for class/completing bellwork when the bell rings. Students habitually tardy to class will receive a detention per LMS policy. 2. Come prepared for class. Bring all necessary supplies, including homework.

	<p>3. Respect your teacher, your classmates, visitors, yourself, and the room.</p> <p>4. Listen and follow directions the first time they are given.</p> <p>5. If it's not yours, don't touch it. Keep your hands and feet to yourself. If you break something of mine, be prepared to replace it. This also applies to school technology.</p> <p>6. Follow all school rules.</p> <p>7. The teacher dismisses the class, not the bell.</p>
Progressive Discipline <i>(LMS Policy)</i>	<p>Step 1: Verbal warning</p> <p>Step 2: Student/teacher conference</p> <p>Step 3: Parent contact/conference</p> <p>Step 4: Detention and a parent contact</p> <p>Step 5: Office referral</p> <p>Students will have a social contract for my class each 9 weeks to document discipline. This will stay in class and students are responsible for getting it out at the start of class each day. Example is linked here.</p>
Grading Policy <i>(MCS Policy)</i>	<p>60% = Assessments (Tests, Essays, Projects)</p> <p>40% = Daily Grades (Quizzes, Homework, Classwork, and Participation)</p>
Late Work Policy	<p>Late work will be accepted up to 3 days after the initial due date, with a deduction of 10 points each day it's late. After 3 days, the highest grade students can make is 70 percent. You must email the teacher after submitting a late assignment in order to receive credit.</p>
Make-up Work/Test Policy	<p>Students with excused absences will be allowed to make-up all work within three days of returning to school. It is the student's responsibility to ask for make-up work. Students can get with a classmate or ask the teacher for help. Work that is not made up will become a zero (including quizzes/tests). Many times, missed quizzes and tests can be made up during school.</p> <p>The scheduled days for English Language Arts tests are Tuesdays and Thursdays. Students will be notified in advance of tests to prepare in a timely manner. If school is closed, tests may be given on the following school day.</p>
Technology	<p>Neither the teacher, nor the school is responsible for broken, stolen, or lost laptops. Laptops and other electronic devices will be used at the individual discretion of the teacher. Students should bring their device and charger to school each day. If students do not have a device, an alternative paper-pencil assignment will be provided. Cell phones should be in backpack or phone pocket chart on silent/vibrate. Students using phones without permission during instruction will be asked to put it in the pocket chart.</p>

Homework	<p>Homework will be assigned when appropriate. Additionally, independent reading will be assigned, and students will be expected to read novels of their choice at home each night. More details about the independent reading assignment will be sent home soon.</p>
