Textbook Information	United States History- Civil War to Present- Houghton Mifflin Harcourt  Textbooks will be used as a supplemental resource in the classroom and will not be checked out to students.
Course Description	This class provides constant opportunities for students to explore prior knowledge and opinions as they focus on the history of the United States from the Industrial Revolution to the present. An emphasis is placed on economic, geographic, and historic changes that have influenced every aspect of life during historical events, such as the rise of the United States as an industrial nation, World War I and II, the Great Depression, and the Cold War. Students will experience cooperative learning, large and small group discussions, hands-on activities, and they will be exposed to primary sources, as they learn about the reorganization of national boundaries and the movement of the United States into the role of world leader.
Course Objectives	The goals of the course are to create an understanding of the major forces that have shaped the history of the United States, examine how Americans from different backgrounds have experienced that history, and understand how that history continues to influence our current understanding of the nation. Students will develop and strengthen critical thinking skills by reading, comprehending, and engaging with both primary sources and informational texts. They will demonstrate their understanding of the text through various formative and summative assessments. Students will be able to respectfully engage critically and constructively in a dialogue of ideas through class discussion, small group assignments, and project-based learning. Students will develop and display clear written and verbal communication skills.

Progressive Discipline (JMS Policy)	All progressive discipline will correspond with the Madison City Schools Code of Conduct regarding Class I and II offenses. Class III offenses are a direct office referral.

Late Work Policy	Students present in class on the day of instruction are expected to turn in all in-class and out-of-class assignments on time. Late work will be accepted for up to 1 letter grade deduction each school day until the unit test is administered to the student not to exceed 50% deduction of points. No work will be accepted after the unit test. No assignment will be graded and input into PowerSchool until this form is completed. Students need to talk to Ms. Jenkins about late work and determine a new due date if necessary.
Make-up Work/Test Policy	Students with excused absences will be allowed to make-up all work within three days of returning to school. It is the student's responsibility to ask for make-up work. Students can get with a classmate or ask the teacher for help. Work that is not made up will become a zero (including quizzes/tests). Make-up tests are completed before or after school and must be arranged in advance.
Technology	Student laptops should not be hard-wired to the network or have print capabilities. Discs, flash drives, jump drives, or other USB devices are not allowed on Madison City computers. Neither the teacher nor the school is responsible for broken, stolen, or lost laptops. Laptops and other electronic devices will be used at the teacher's individual discretion.
Cell Phone Policy	Students are welcome to bring personal electronic devices to school. Students will not be allowed to use cell phones during class. Cell phones may be used during class transitions and lunch. All cell phones must be placed in student's backpacks or a cell phone holder sleeve that the teacher has placed in the designated area of the classroom during the entirety of the instructional block. Also, remember that the student is responsible for locking and securing personal devices. JMS is not responsible for lost, stolen, or damaged cell phones and other electronic devices. Students should ensure personal devices are always in a safe and secure location. Additionally, students may not use their devices to do anything inappropriate that would disrupt the learning environment at Journey Middle School.
Cheating/Plagiarism	A student who cheats will not receive credit for the work in question. If any other student has cooperated in cheating, that student is also considered to have cheated and will not receive credit.
